Proverbs 15:1-14

A proverb is a short and wise saying which has become well known due to common usage. We have many common proverbs in English, such as "Haste makes waste" and "Better safe than sorry." The inspired book of Proverbs is a collection of short and wise sayings, mostly by King Solomon (*1 Kings 4:32; Eccl. 12:9*). A proverb consists of a truth stated in few words and easy to remember. Proverbs are moral in their teaching, each proverb making it clear what is right and what is wrong. There are as many chapters in the book of Proverbs as there are days in most months (*31*). Some believers read one chapter each day, finishing the book in one month. For years I have been collecting hundreds of pithy (uninspired) proverbs or sentence sermons which believers have found helpful.

Here are some examples:

•What you love and what you hate reveal the kind of person you are.

•An atheist cannot find God for the same reason a thief cannot find a policeman.

- Few people are big enough to become small enough for God to use them.
 One snowflake isn't much by itself, but it takes a bulldozer to move them when they cooperate.
- •To prevent truth decay, read your Bible every day.
- •A man who is all wrapped up in himself makes a very small package.

•When we put our cares into His hands, He puts His calm into our hearts.

•God formed us; sin deformed us; Christ alone can transform us.

•Most worries are reruns.
